PROJECT SUMMARY

RurAll: Rural Alliance for Greater Democratic Participation

The RurAll project, co-funded by the CERV Program of the European Commission, brings together 13 partners from across Europe — Bulgaria, France, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Portugal, Croatia, Slovakia, Slovenia and Spain. United by a shared commitment to revitalizing rural communities, the project focuses on democratic participation, cultural and economic development, and civic engagement.

Rural areas often face **geographic isolation, limited access to resources, and a disconnect from broader political and economic landscapes**. To address these challenges, **RurAll** seeks to strengthen democratic legitimacy, promote civic participation, and foster European values in rural territories.

Over the course of the project, **six international meetings** will take place in different European countries. These gatherings will provide a platform for participants to **exchange knowledge**, **share best practices**, **and develop innovative solutions** tailored to the needs of rural communities. Through discussions, workshops, and cultural experiences, the project will enhance understanding, build networks, and empower citizens to take an active role in shaping their communities.

The initiative also aims to **combat misinformation**, **bridge the gap between urban and rural political engagement**, **and encourage youth participation**. By working closely with local authorities, civil society organizations, and grassroots initiatives, **RurAll** will help build more **inclusive**, **resilient**, **and participatory rural communities**.

As a key outcome, handbooks will be created based on contributions from project partners, addressing the different challenges discussed at each meeting. These handbooks will serve as a collection of best practices and practical solutions to promote a rural for all (RurAll), ensuring that lessons learned and successful strategies can be shared and implemented across European rural territories.

The project's long-term vision includes **empowering local leaders**, **creating sustainable materials**, **and developing strategies for continuous community engagement beyond the funding period**. This ambitious initiative contributes to **EU integration**, **intercultural dialogue**, **and democratic engagement**, reinforcing the essential role of rural areas in the future of Europe.

TRZEBNICa





Trzebnica is a town with a rich history dating back to the 5th century CE. First mentioned in 1138, it became an important religious center after Duke Henry the Bearded and Saint Hedwig founded the first Cistercian convent in Poland and a Romanesque church in 1202. It received town rights in 1250.

Over the centuries, Trzebnica came under Czech, Habsburg, and Prussian rule. In the 17th–18th centuries, Polish abbesses enriched the town's architecture, and notable artists worked here. In 1703, Maria Karolina Leszczyńska, future Queen of France, was born in Trzebnica.

After the secularization of the convent in 1810, the town developed as a health resort. Since 1861, the Sisters of Mercy of St. Borromeo have been active in the town. Despite World War II, the historic basilica and convent were saved in 1945.

Post-war, Trzebnica was rebuilt and expanded. In 1974, it became home to the Limb Replantation and Microsurgery Center. Since 1999, it has served as a county capital and is now experiencing dynamic growth in infrastructure, transport, education, and tourism, making it an attractive place to live and visit.

Trzebnica is located in the northern part of Lower Silesia, in the range of the Trzebnica Hills. A short distance from the capital of Lower Silesia, Wrocław, as well as natural, tourist, and historic assets,

account for an interesting alternative to spend free time away from metropolitan bustle. Rich history, interesting places for hiking and recreation, as well as modern objects for practicing activity recreation, show enormous cultural and scenic potential of Trzebnica. The charm of the place is emphasized additionally by picturesque hills surrounding the city, vast orchards, and the Beech Forest (Las Bukowy), as well as the nearby ponds of Trzebnica, the terrains of the pre-war health resort. An unforgettable place of activity recreation for whole families is the modern Commune Water Park TRZEBNICA-ZDRÓJ. The heart of the city is the charming modernized central market square of Trzebnica. The positive image of the city is created also by numerous municipal parks with renovated fountains, strolling lanes, children's playgrounds, or bicycle paths.
